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









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EDITORIAL Waldo Malan


The Word of God is our Eternal Connection

This scripture is telling us to take charge of every thought that enters our minds. We are to sift through them, casting out those that are fear based and contrary to the Bible and hold fast to those thoughts that are in line and agreeable to His written Word.

ne time at a conference, I had a group of children come up on the stage to demonstrate a point. I gave each of them a gift, and each child gladly took what I handed them without hesitation. Several of them excitedly thanked me and a few even told me they love me.

These kids freely received my gifts to them. Not one of them said, "Wait a minute, Sister Joyce. I don't deserve this. I haven't been good this week and I can't take it." And none of them looked at me suspiciously, wondering why I wanted to give them something. They just received it with joy!

The same way these children received my gifts to them is the way God wants us to receive from Him – freely and with joy. *"Ask and keep on asking and you will receive, so that your joy (gladness, delight) may be full and complete" (John 16:24 Amp).*

If you're struggling with life, chances are you haven't freely received God's gifts, such as His love, grace, mercy and forgiveness, so you can have the life Jesus died to give you.

The Mentality That Keeps Us from Receiving from God

We tend to have a mentality of getting things, not receiving them. To get means, "to obtain by struggle and effort." If everything in life is a struggle and effort, you won't enjoy much of it and you'll be frustrated a lot.

Getting things puts the burden on us because we have to figure out how to manipulate circumstances to make them work out the way we want them to. But the Bible talks about receiving, not getting.

How a Religious Attitude Keeps Us from God's Goodness



We all need to ask God for His love, forgiveness, mercy, and grace. Just say, "God, please bless me. I receive Your blessings in my life, not because I'm good and have earned them, but because You are good!" Then your joy will be full.



AN ORPHANED **HEART**

Mometown Clarens in the Eastern Free State. She told me how hometown Clarens in the Eastern Free State. She told me how her son of 12 has lost his knife somewhere in town during the weekend. It was not an ordinary knife but one that he crafted himself with his dad after they went together for training on how to make knives.

The dad has, on many occasions, warned the boy about how he should handle and take care of his knife, but this incident has taught the young man a lesson of life. The dad, after this incident, spent a lot of time reflecting on how he warned the son in the past, how he trained him to treat his precious knife. It seemed to the father that all his warnings went unheeded and that his son showed no real understanding, yet now the pain of losing a precious object brought a keener appreciation. In turn this life lesson will become one of the significant teachings for the young man when he is a father himself one day. Although this experience is painful for the parents, they can see it as a life lesson and not a way to punish the son, of inflict guilt on him.

During each session when I help families I become more and more aware of how orphaned we are as people due to past relationships. I see people with wealth, degrees, beauty, and great gifting can act from places of deep heartache despite all their exterior success. If a person's core is not nurtured from young, this individual stays in lack his entire life; unless of course we allow God the Father, the Son and Spirit to make us whole as it was preordained through the action of the Cross.

I find in families where a parent (or both) is living with an orphaned spirit, a resulting difficulty to live in harmony. This is principally due to strife among family members because of lack of leadership from the father, either because he does not lead strong enough or because he does not lead at all. A great disunity is birthed due to a lack of a family vision and values. Often this lack of family values finds a negative breeding ground in the disciplining of the hearts of the children. In short, the children are not presented with clear guidelines which will ultimately lead to them being spoiled; children are capable of manipulation, or they simply do as they please.

To spoil a child can be the most traumatic single act in a person's life as the heart of this person has never learnt to honour, obey, or have self-control. Even good parents can make major errors due to the standing of their own hearts. Secure parents do not have issues with the disciplining of their children, as they understand that a person simply lives out what is already in their hearts.

I have done a lot of research over the years on why adults become so dysfunctional and why they cannot effectively take up their role as life givers. Parenting often fails when either one or both parents display a spirit of control. If a future father was raised in such a controlling environment, he will be unable to be successful in his role of parenting as well. Sadly, this father will be distant, retreating into a closed spirit, isolating his heart from outside influence. He will be incapable of real intimate relationships in his own family, and it could result in a next generation being orphaned in their hearts too. One example where these kind of 'flawed' relationships would develop is where a very hardworking, conventional parent with strong views on ways in which they wanted tasks completed, tried to raise a very sensitive and compassionate child who did things at a slower pace. The fact that the two people (parent and child) have such different working preferences would escalate into major frustrations and personality incompatibilities. I am using these two disparate personality types to illustrate why parents, with sincere intensions of wanting the best for their family, can in fact hurt a person who is supposed pass on the baton to the next generation. We are often guilty of unnecessarily delaying the work of the Kingdom for many years.

It is easy for parents to accept the child when they share similar characteristics, styles, and values. However, what should be done in the case where they differ dramatically? The challenge is that parents must rely on God daily to give them an understanding about the purpose for each child. There will be a serious need for more patience and wisdom lest a sensitive child is negatively affected. For parents to celebrate and honour a child who is not like themself is a great test. Honour involves a decision that is made to put love in action, and to give a person a position of high value and worth. If there is not honour, there is judgement, resentment, anger, sarcasm, criticism, comparisons, favouritism, envy and even racism. Parents can choose to dishonour or give the gift of honouring. Before one is either a parent or a child, one is human first, eternally stamped with the image and likeness of the Creator. Because all people are unique, we need to honour each other.

My suggestion to struggling parents is to find a mentor - somebody with the love of the Father, wise and graceful, but also a strict person who can give counsel according to the word of God. Parents must learn to share their life with a significant mentor who can model a life of intimate, caring and loving relationships, and to give guidance where changes in the raising of children can be instituted. These same virtues should also be emphasised in churches and life groups.

God wants parents to live a life of grace towards their families. Orphan thinking should be exchanged for God-thinking; in other words, the root of our deliberation should be as a child of God. The Father of Creation has a special place for each person He created. On the other hand, the father of lies (and maybe our own earthly father and mother) has caused an orphan spirit.

Satan wants to weaken the nations, and he does this by weakening families. He causes people to be neglected so they don't feel they have a home anymore, and at times as if they never had a home.

There is a new generation of families that I am working with - those are the families that take the education of their children seriously. These families allow God to change them as parents first and then they start practicing parenting from a true son and daughter relationship. While it does not make them perfect parents, it does allow them to operate from a place of forgiveness. They have forgiven their own parents - if they were not true reflections of the heart of the Father - and they are forgiving in their relationships with their own children. These parents that make a difference in the Kingdom are true children of God; Jesus said, *"Unless you are converted and become like children, you will not enter the Kingdom of heaven. Whoever then humbles himself as this child, he is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven" (Matt 18: 3 - 4).*



THE MARKETPLACE

Doors are opening for us as believers to share our faith with those in the world. Luke 11:37 (NKJV) "And as he spoke, a certain Pharisee asked Him to dine with him. He went in and sat down to eat."

Jesus ate with a Pharisee in his home. The Pharisee was amazed that He would come into his home and eat with him. This is the case in so many instances today, where people become offended in the church because believers associate with the world. We need to get into the market place. Many young people want to go full time for the Lord. I always suggest to them that the best way is to get your degree, get your trade, get your qualifications and use that as an instrument to speak to the unbeliever. I know there are many witnesses for Jesus Christ in the Middle-East today, they go in as engineers, nurses, teachers etc. They would not get access to Muslim countries if they put on their application form; 'evangelist or pastor'.

Paul, who I would say was one of the greatest evangelist in the Bible, was a tent maker by trade. As a result, he had access into that area purely because of the nature of his trade. God has give me wonderful access in amongst the country folk, because I am a farmer. When I receive invitations to preach, it is not because I am a great preacher, but rather that I am a farmer. Do not look down on your background and where you originate from; use everything that you have to bring people closer to Christ.

The most important part to remember is that the Lord says that we are in the world, but we are not part of the world. We need to be so careful that we don't become as the world in order to win somebody to Christ. I remember myself as an unbeliever, I used to get so angry and so disappointed in 'so-called Christians' who would act more disrespectfully at parties and socials than the unbelievers, and then on Sunday, be in church and act "holier than thou". This type of hypocrisy kept me out of the church. We need to be able to go into areas where people don't know Jesus, but not change our standard or our principles in life.

So the bottom line is, before we accept an invitation to a party or to an event, we need to ask our Father if we have His permission and whether it will be beneficial to the Kingdom. If the answer is no, then don't go. We need to be Christians seven days a week, not now and again. Whether we are in the work situation, whether we are in church, whether we are at a sports event, the same set of rules applies. Remember the world is looking to the believer to set the bar when it comes to things like morality, standards and ethics.

I remember reading the story of Peter Marshall many years ago. He told how he was invited to speak at a champagne breakfast in Washington DC, these men were all multi-millionaires. He thought the only reason that he was invited was because they wanted him to say grace. All the glasses were turned upwards and were filled with champagne, but he left his glass facing downwards. He told the waiter that he didn't want any champagne and he drank fruit juice instead. The man sitting next to him said, "I see you are not drinking this fine imported champagne from Paris". The preacher said, "No I'm not". The gentleman wanted to know why. And the preacher asked him, "Are you asking me why because



you are trying to make conversation or because you really want to know?" He answered that he really wanted to know. He said; "Well, sir, I'm the minister at that big church down town in Washington DC and during the week, big limousines come and wealthy ladies get out of them and come and seek my counsel. Nine times out of ten, their tragedies in their lives are underlined by alcohol abuse. How can I counsel them if I am partaking myself?" The rich man went to see him a week later and committed his life to Christ.

It is not always what we say that impresses the world, but it is how we act when we are in the market place. Let us keep preaching the Gospel at all costs and if we really need to, use words (St Augustine).



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A CHALLENGE FOR CHRISTIAN LEADERS ABOUT

These days, it's pretty common for leaders of all kinds to study trends, cultural issues, or "pendulums" in an effort to predict or at least be ready for what's coming in the future. And the truth is, we do go through certain cycles – for instance, I was informed at Christmas by my daughters that bell bottoms were back in style.

Who knew?

But the truth that all the consultants won't tell you is that NOBODY knows what's coming. While there are a lot of "futurists" out there, no one can really predict the future.

I'm a member of the Producers Guild of America here in Hollywood. Every year before the Academy Awards, we interview the nominees, hoping they have insights and the keys to the future of the movie business. But by the next year, most of those "visionaries" have completely disappeared off the radar.

And remember that the advertising and entertainment industries spend hundreds of millions of dollars trying to determine what's coming, but time and time again, movies and advertising still fail.

"I try not to get involved in the business of prediction. It's a quick way to look like an idiot." – Warren Ellis, comic book and sci-fi writer

But I believe that while we can't predict the future, we can position ourselves to be ready for whatever happens. As the great artist Michelangelo said, "I never stop learning." There's a reason there are so many "one-trick ponies" and only a few consistent, longgame players out there.

That reason isn't brilliance or the ability to know what's coming – it's the ability to prepare yourself to be resilient in the storm.

So, I recommend 5 ways to prepare yourself to handle the future and use it as an asset. Particularly with respect to the coming year, here's what I'd recommend:

1) Get comfortable with uncertainty. The future likely involves ambiguity and change across the social, technological, and economic landscapes. We're already experiencing changes faster than at any time in history, so get comfortable with the unexpected. Help your organization get better at exploring different scenarios

and adapting when needed. Get the team together and discuss alternative futures and how we would respond to each one. I wrote my most recent book "Ideas on a Deadline" for that very reason – to help leaders function brilliantly under pressure.

2) Focus on your team. It never ceases to amaze me how little leaders know and understand their team, so look closely at your people's capabilities and bandwidth. In most Christian organizations, a huge age transition is coming. Older and more experienced employees will be leaving, and you'll need to train a new generation. Recognize and reward achievements. Foster an innovative, collaborative, high-performing culture, because culture is far more important than vision. Never forget that none of us is as smart as all of us.

3) Reorient yourself toward action. Ultimately, creativity is about problem-solving, but remarkably few people are oriented toward taking action when a crisis happens. In a world of uncertainty, you can't always wait to see what happens; you need to act first. Stop ignoring problems, assuming someone else will deal with them. Instead, always be ready to make a plan and take action. It can certainly take time to recover from a major setback or loss, but nothing changes until you act.

4) Reflect on your vision and strategy. Review your organization's mission, goals, and plans. Update them if needed to align with emerging trends and priorities going into the year. Get outside advice and counsel. You'll have to articulate a clear vision to inspire and guide your team.

5) Learn to listen to different voices in the culture. If God could speak through a donkey or a burning bush, he can certainly speak through a rockstar, a filmmaker, or a novelist. Instead of automatically shutting those voices down, we need to open up and at least hear what they have to say. You don't have to agree with everyone, but you do need to know the temperature in the room. We should always be prepared to engage with culture, even when it's uncomfortable.

Personal preparation is everything because planning is often impossible. – Andrew Edmiston, Managing Director, IM Group

FINANCIALLY SPEAKING... A SYSTEM THAT WILL NEVER FAIL Greg Clur

n a previous article I began to describe the futility of the world economic system, the incredibly magnetic attraction of mammon and the quiet desperation that many feel in pursuing the world's concept of success and financial achievement. In this article I wish to concentrate rather on the alternative which God provides for those who have accepted Christ as their Saviour and are actively seeking the Kingdom of God and His righteousness with every fibre of their being.

We know that one of the principal priorities in God's plan for man is for us to seek the Kingdom of God His righteousness with all our hearts. It is only in this manner that we can really contemplate exercising and enjoying the dominion authority that He promises us in Genesis 1 V 26-28. The world system concentrates on the accumulation and ownership of material things whereas in the Kingdom, we are entitled to stewardship of unlimited provision, and we have access to it as opposed to ownership. God's thinking is fundamentally different to that of the world. We need to begin to think as he does.

In the world system, possessions tend to dictate our sense of self-worth. We accumulate these things by effort and strife. Our care and welfare are our responsibility. We achieve success by effort. Essentially, the pursuit of our purpose requires that we provide for our success. Many times, we seek a career and tend to dominate others.

In God's system Jesus and citizenship of His Kingdom represents our selfworth. We access provision by right and not strife. Our care and welfare is the King's responsibility. Our success is determined by favour. God funds His purpose for us, and our lives are characterised by servanthood as opposed to domination. Our lives are a calling!

What a wonderful plan. The requirement? – Seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness with every fibre of our being.

really am a "four-seasons-in-one-day" type of girl. This basically means that my emotional state fluctuates drastically from one hour to the next, and is highly influenced by what I do and who I engage with. Ask me how I am in the morning, and ask me how I am in the evening. You might think that you are speaking to a different human being. Add being poetic and female into that mix, and this tendency to experience every shade of emotion in one day makes for an interesting life. For those who believe in the spiritual realm – that has a massive impact on me too. I'm still figuring out when I'm going through something, or when some principality is up to something. Discernment is an interesting gift.

I have been through bouts of borderline depression (particularly associated with mourning), and I have been through seasons of mountain-top joy. I have made peace with the fact that I will always have a slight roller-coaster personality. As long as it doesn't affect people around me too much, I think that's just going to have to be ok.

However.

It's been a particular interesting season, and I don't think the complete revelation of its purpose has shone through. But it always helps me to unpack a few of the questions that my heart sometimes agonises over, and in the process, perhaps help other hearts understand, or at least voice, their own

questions.

One of the main things that have been perplexing to me over the past season is the conduct of love in the context of truth.

My question is as follows: Does loving a person imply always telling them the complete truth? I don't mean "the Truth" in terms of pointing them to the Gospel or giving Biblical advice. I mean: should we always be honest about our own feelings in every relational context? Or are their times where love means that you just suck it up and deny yourself?

Consider the implications of both sides. Integrity is at stake. But so is responsibility and maturity.

I don't have an answer. It's just a question I'm currently perplexed over.

Another thing that has been popping up recently, is the issue of humility. I'm sure most people have been tempted to say to someone "Do you not know who I am?", or it's equally self-righteous equivalent "Who do you think you are?". I've been a bit tempted to throw those lines on a few odd occasions over the past while. I know humility is not a denial of your competencies. That's false humility. I know it has to do with an acknowledgement of dependence on God for everything, and then just being who you are. I also know that a sense of humour and not taking yourself too seriously are keys to rest and happiness. I have just been challenged over the past while to serve in ways and contexts where I would have preferred to not have to. It made me angry. And then it made me realise how ugly pride is.

So, yes.

My heart has again been in a process of wrestling with important themes that have personal significance, whilst also knowing that constant introspection often just leads to despondence. I am becoming more aware of how self-absorption really does just get in the way of joy.

So, then I look up and see the pretty purple flowers that are carpeting the Boland in preparation for Spring. I look at those flowers, and I remember that Someone once said the following: "Consider how the wildflowers grow: They don't labour or spin thread. Yet I tell you, not even Solomon in all his splendour was adorned like one of these! If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today, and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, how much more will he clothe you, you of little faith!"

Then I just go: "Jesus, You win".

And carry on with this business of life, despite the perplexing conundrums, but without denying the difficult.



FINDING GOD'S PLACES **OF COMFORT** Keith Hershey

ne of my earliest childhood memories of a "place of comfort" was my Grandma Opal's house. I think the most frequent question she ever asked was, "Are you comfortable?" And then there were those special memories when you were sick—or thought you were sick—of large pillows, warm flannel, and tall mugs of either cold milk shakes or hot chicken soup to sip. Grandma's house sure was a "place of comfort!"

In the increasing pressures of today's world, my grandma's house could offer comfort to almost anyone. There are spiritual, mental, and physical needs going unmet all around us. You, too, may be searching to find a comforter; someone, somewhere, that can help to meet your needs. Search no more! The Comforter is here!

Jesus lived the life of a Comforter when He walked on earth. As the time neared for Him to return to His Father in Heaven, Jesus told His disciples, "And I will pray the Father, and He shall give you another Comforter to abide with you forever . . . the Comforter, who is the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in My name, He shall teach you all things" (John 14:16, 26).

All things—what all things? The Apostle Paul tells the church congregation in Rome, *"For whatever things were written before, were written for our learning, that we through the patience and comfort of the Scriptures might have hope" (Romans 15:4).* What are some of those comforting things (Words) that were written before?

The Words the Lord our God spoke to people living many years ago, are the same Words He is speaking to us living today. And they will be the same Words for the people who live in the tomorrows, because *"Jesus is the same, yesterday, today and forever"* (Hebrews 13:8).

The power of God's Word and the revelation teaching of His Holy Spirit make comfort promises available to everyone. *"Wherefore comfort one another with these Words" (1 Thessalonians 4:18).* The following are a few samples of the comfort of the Scriptures:

• **Plagues:** "There shall no evil befall thee, neither shall any plague come near your dwelling" (Psalm 91:10).

• **Financial worries:** "Do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink; nor about your body, what you will put on . . . for your Heavenly Father knows that you need all these things. But seek first the kingdom of God . . . and all these things shall be added to you" (Matthew 6:25, 32, 33).

• **Lacking Sleep:** "I will both lie down in peace, and sleep; for You alone, O Lord, make me dwell in safety" (Psalm 4:8); "And your sleep will be sweet" (Proverbs 3:24).



• **Turmoil:** "My peace I give to you not as the world gives do I give to you, let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid" (John 14:27).

• **Protection Security:** "The Lord will cause your enemies who rise against you to be defeated before your face" (Deuteronomy 28:7).

• Without Confidence: "For the Lord will be your confidence and will keep your foot from being caught" (Proverbs 3:26).

• **Troubles:** "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. Therefore, we will not fear" (Psalm 46:1).

The Scripture is a bountiful treasure chest of comfort and encouragement. And with the Apostle Paul we bless God that this is so: "Blessed be God, even the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies, and the God of all comfort, Who comforts us in all our tribulation" (2 Corinthians 1:3, 4).

God wants to give comfort to each of us, by meeting our every need, if we only make the choice to trust and obey His Word. Jesus told His disciples that they erred (they didn't have the comfort of their needs being met), because they did not know the Scriptures, nor did they know the power of God. Let's get

to know (become intimately acquainted with) God's Word so that we really believe "*The* Word of God is alive and full of power" (Hebrews 4:12). And let's speak God's Words to bring comfort for God said, "I speak, and the Word which I speak will come to pass" (Ezekiel 12:25).

The Apostle Paul also points out to the Corinthian church that God's comfort is two-fold. "The God of all comfort, Who comforts us in all our tribulation, (does so) "that we may be able to comfort them who are in any trouble, by the comfort with which we ourselves are comforted of God" (2 Corinthians 1:4). When Jesus walked on earth, He habitually sacrificed His own personal convenience and comfort to meet the needs of others.

Individually, as we follow His example, we will become comforters, but together, oh friends get excited with me, together, we can be more than comforters. Together, we can make our church, our congregation, a place of comfort. A place where people know they can come and have every need met. A place where people come with unmet needs, but leave *"forgiven, healed, redeemed, crowned, satisfied and renewed, comforted" (Psalm 103).*

Now that's a timely ministry, every godly congregation joining together in our mutual faith (Romans 1:12), to comfort and to be comforted (1 Thessalonians 5:11), working to copy the First Century Church and fill God's House with peace where people are edified by the comfort of the Holy Spirit. 





SACRIFICE AND WORSHIP

esus clearly says that the Father is seeking worshippers (John 4:23). This says to me that in order to be a worshipper one has to be worshipping, and because God Most High is doing the seeking, He is going to be looking for something very specific. Jesus further underlines this by saying that the worship associated with the Father-worshipper needs to be in spirit and in truth. So many times our human nature deceives us into thinking that what the Father is really looking for are workers and doers of things. Put in another way, our human nature, especially the sinful nature subject to the law, has a constant need to make sacrifices. While the Jews in the Old Testament sacrificed animals we tend to sacrifice works in our contemporary contexts. By "works" I mean anything that we can find to do that we regard as being good and ultimately pleasing to the Father. Understand that I am not saying that doing things are bad, or that pleasing the Father by our works are wrong or displeasing to Him! No, but what I am trying to get across is that when we present the Father only with works and no worship then we cannot possibly please Him. This means that whatever we do needs to be done from a position of worship: doing because we worship and not worshipping because we are doina.

The expression "walk your talk" is so relevant in our worship of God with regard to offering sacrifices vs. offering relationship. The Father is seeking a relationship with all people when most of us tend to want to offer a sacrifice. The basic problem with a sacrifice is that it is a momentary thing with tremendous power, both for the one to whom the sacrifice is made as well as the one making the sacrifice. This problem manifests in the fact that the act of sacrifice appeases our consciences and allows us to live life after the event pretty much in the same manner as we did before. Sacrificing has the ability to allow us to shift the responsibility of careless living onto an object (either an animal or some type of action). When I say "careless living" I am speaking directly about a life without a relationship with the One whom we are sacrificing for. This transference of responsibility will lead us into a legal way of thinking and living, and also deceive us into thinking that God requires our relationship with Him to be based on a set of rules. By this I am not implying that the things we do are necessarily bad, because much of what we do will be considered good works, moral works and works that benefit our communities!

I see a sacrificial attitude manifest itself so clearly in the Church today. A sacrificial attitude make people believe that going to church on a Sunday for an hour or two and then ignoring God for the rest if the week is acceptable. This attitude allows people to believe that an active prayer life can be sacrificed because they are too busy doing the "right things" required for their individual ministries. It is an attitude that will make people bitter against God because they seem to be doing all the work while others are seemingly lazing around doing nothing – a classical Martha-Mary scenario (Luke 10:38-42). A sacrificial attitude will lead to a spiritual burnout rather sooner than later and suffer the kingdom of God by the loss of a precious soul.

This line of thinking made me conclude that if the Father is seeking worshippers and not workers, I probably need to get a refresher course on worship. Having said all I have about working and sacrificing, I also realise that to worship will require some type of action (or work) on my part, meaning that it is not the work in itself that is wrong, but it is the way in which the work is done that matters to God.



This way of thinking is supported by Scripture, because the Father is the One Who is searching the hearts of men and is not led astray by our appearances. The conclusion is a simple one: our works simply happen because we are worshipping, not that our worship is simply happening because we are working! So by the grace of God the pressure of having to perform in our worship (a totally human way of reasoning) is removed completely from us and placed with the Holy Spirit. After all, our worship has to be in spirit and in truth, not in human endeavours and accomplishments! The Father is seeking specific people: worshippers. Specific worshippers will have specific worship – a worship that is exposed through the pages of God's Word time and again. Allow the Holy Spirit to speak to you as you read the following Scriptures, and ask Him to lead you into a deeper understanding of your personal relationship with the Father through Jesus Christ, so that you can be free in your worship without having to be weighed down by rules, regulations and burdens placed there by yourself, others and tradition. Allow the Holy Spirit to take you into new realms of worship where the Father can find you at the end of His search, worshipping Him with all your heart, mind, soul and strength.

Any musician will eventually come face to face with modes. Not only should they be able to understand modes theoretically, but they'll also need a solid command of them on their respective instruments.

Is a Mode a Scale?

According to its most basic definition, a mode is simply a **scale**. But, a mode is also a **tonality**, much like the major scale has its own tonality. In fact, the **major scale** itself is one of the seven modes—called the **lonian mode**.

When a **C** major scale is played, the root note **C** establishes its **tonality**. All notes that follow are defined according to their relationship to C. Playing through the scale, it is C major's characteristic intervals or relationships to C that give the key its distinct tonality.

We know that this scale continues in a repetitive sequence up and down the staff. If C major is this exact sequence of notes from one C to the next C an octave higher, one could also start the sequence on D.

The sequence of notes stays the same, but the root note changes to D. Now, all of the notes in this sequence are defined by their relationship to D. This changes the scale's tonality considerably. Even though the sequence is the same, the stepwise relationships have changed: W-H-W-W-H-W. The relationship established makes this the **Dorian** mode.

To get a better understanding, let us continue using the C major scale (or Ionian Mode).

- Root on the first degree (C): Ionian mode
- Root on the 2nd degree (D): Dorian mode
- Root on the 3rd degree (E): Phrygian mode
- Root on the 4th degree (F): Lydian mode
- Root on the 5th degree (G): Mixolydian mode
- Root on the 6th degree (A): Aeolian mode
- Root on the 7th degree (B): Lochrian mode

Chord-Scale Relationships in the Major Key

Each of the seven modes is built off of the seven scale





degrees of the major scale, as well as the diatonic chords of the major key. Each mode of the major scale has a corresponding diatonic chord.

In improvisation, if you (1) know the key of the tune and (2) can figure out what scale degree of the major scale that chord is built from, you know which mode you can use over that chord.

For example, let's take a simple chord progression that appears in many songs: I-vi-ii-V in the key of F.

Fmaj7 is the (I) chord, so we'll use F Ionian in bar 1 Dm7 is the (vi) chord, so we'll use D Aeolian in bar 2 Gm7 is the (ii) chord, so we'll use G Dorian in bar 3 C7 is the (V) chord, so we'll use C Mixolydian in bar 4



Starting Practice Tips

[1] Instead of playing all the modes in the key of C, practice all the modes with C as the root. It's beneficial to use a drone note for this exercise.

- C Ionian mode (key of C)
- C Dorian mode (key of Bb)
- C Phrygian mode (key of Ab)
- C Lydian mode (key of G)
- C Mixolydian mode (key of F)
- C Aeolian mode (key of Eb)
- C Locrian mode (key of Db)

[2] Pick one musical mode and move it up or down different intervals. For example:

- C Dorian (key of Bb)
- D Dorian (key of C)
- E Dorian (key of D)
- F# Dorian (key of E)
- Ab Dorian (Key of Gb)
- Bb Dorian (Key of Ab)
- C Dorian (Key of Bb)

WORSHIP LEADERS ARE NOT ROCK STARS**, BUT** THEY ARE PERFORMERS

y youth pastor used to say of our Wednesday night worship services: "This is not a concert!" And his warning was certainly correct and helpful. But I can't help but think that the sensory experience of our services often stood in contradiction to what my youth pastor was saying. The lights, sounds, and vibe of the room correlated to what many of us would identify plainly as a concert. But it wasn't a concert. Right?

It's complicated.

On one hand we know corporate worship—particularly congregational singing—is something distinct from a concert or other performed art or entertainment. When the church gathers and sings together, there's a "set apart-ness," a qualitative difference from any other kind of gathering or event in which someone, or group of people, is singing.

On the other hand Christians are called to worship God in every facet of their lives (Col. 3:17; Rom. 12:1), seeing our work, for example, as an opportunity to glorify God. What happens when Christians practice the "all of life" worship in their vocation, in part, by leading other Christians in corporate singing?

Enter the awkward position of the worship leader.

Inherently Performative

Worship leaders—that is, musical worship leaders, for the whole gathering is worship are doing something different from entertaining, but their role entails some elements that are inherently performative: aesthetic sensibilities, technical proficiency, and stage presence. These elements may be obvious or subtle, but they are there, and they have to be dealt with.

Some churches deal with these elements by simplifying song arrangements and musical accompaniment to reduce opportunities for worship leaders to embellish or direct attention to themselves. Other churches, often operating with high production value, see these performative elements as assets to be used in full capacity, with little thought toward what end they're serving. And most tragically, some worship leaders are blind to the unique power that comes with performance, and their naïveté causes serious harm to others and themselves.

The word "performance" itself has become a kind of antonym for the word "worship." In the context of church life, I don't think I've ever heard the word used except as a critique of the way a musician is leading—seeking their own glory instead of God's. But this is not entirely fair. I think Christian performers, whether in the realm of dance, music, or theater, would be offended at the notion that their performance robs God's glory and seeks it for themselves. That is certainly a temptation, but any Christian performer who views vocation through a biblical lens recognizes that his or her work is a service to others and an occasion for worship. So what's the distinction in roles between a godly performer and a godly worship leader?

Distinctive Service

A Christian performer serves people who have chosen to lend a listening ear or an attentive eye (or both). The audience participates by paying attention, and so the performer's job is to help ensure their attention is well invested. A worship leader, on the other hand, serves people who have been called to sing; the performative elements of his or her job should serve that end.

This doesn't mean we strip things back to their bare essentials, because that doesn't

always encourage people to sing passionately and wholeheartedly. It also doesn't mean we give full freedom to our aesthetic sensibilities, technical ability, or stage presence, because that can end up being manipulative or confusing.

Five Ways to Steward Performance

Here are a handful of ways worship leaders can steward their performance to best serve the church.

1. Grow in aesthetic tastes.

Worship leaders should regularly listen to music and engage in art beyond what's popular in their particular circles. Listen to music that is challenging, intricate, born of a culture outside your own. Listen to music that feels more like a complex, delicious meal than a protein bar or energy drink. The more we grow in this, the more we are filled with wonder that God calls his people to employ the gift of music to worship him—and that we get to be part of leading his people in that response, to the praise of his glorious grace.

2. Grow in technical ability.

If we are called to work wholeheartedly in whatever we do (Col. 3:17), Christians have the greatest reasons to pursue vocational excellence. Worship leaders might find it wasteful to put intentional time into growing their craft, but in God's eyes, this is time well spent.

Worship leaders who grow in aesthetic tastes and technical ability, with the aim of serving God's people, will have a growing capacity for discernment. They will grow in the ability to choose, arrange, and lead songs in a way that boosts congregational singing, rather than their own ego.

3. Avoid novelty.

There's a temptation for worship leaders to use their gifts in such a way that they're perceived as clever, witty, or cutting edge. Steer clear of this temptation.

Novelty masquerades as creativity and beauty, but it's a cheap replacement. If we're seeking to point people to the glory and beauty of God, we are shooting ourselves in the foot if we give our churches cheap tricks and amusement.

4. Build a team of musicians from the congregation.

Psalm 150:4 calls God's people to "praise him with tambourine and dance; praise him with strings and pipe!" In 1 Chronicles 15, as the ark of the covenant is brought to Jerusalem, David "commanded the chiefs of the Levites to appoint their brothers as the singers who should play loudly on musical instruments, on harps and lyres and cymbals, to raise sounds of joy" (v. 16).

The worship of God's people can and should be led and accompanied by a skilled group of musicians, and the Bible demonstrates that robust musical expression can serve God's people as they sing. But as we consider worship leading in our churches, the liturgy (literally, "the work of the people") should be led primarily by the people. It is the work of the congregation, not the work of outside professionals.

In my church, we have music team members who sing or play music professionally, and others who are hobbyists. While we have standards in place for leading, there's a concerted effort to make sure our team comprises people within the church. This approach helps mitigate the pressure to look and sound the same as the most popular worship band on the Christian music charts. It frees us up instead to look and sound like the people of our

church community, and hopefully, the neighborhoods we represent.

5. Follow Jesus, who leads us in singing.

In Hebrews 2 we see this curious quote from Psalm 22:22: "I will tell of your name to my brothers; in the midst of the congregation I will sing your praise." These words are attributed to Jesus himself, who is not ashamed to call us brothers and sisters. Isn't that amazing? For worship leaders, the hope that gives us both humility and also confidence in leading God's people is that Jesus himself leads us and sings with us. When we begin to experience Jesus's presence with us as we lead, temptations toward self-glory and misuse of power begin to diminish, and we lead more creatively, more selflessly, and more fruitfully.

I long for that in my own ministry—maybe you do, too. Let's pray for a greater awareness of Christ's transforming presence in the midst of our church gatherings, and may we experience renewal and revival as a result.
